Linking Renewable Energy and Girls' Education

Tanzanian teachers trained under the direction of Maureen Mungai in 2016 at the Dinka School, in Arusha. The teachers worked hard to develop meaningful lesson plans in the coming months. While practicing the goal of "Oneness," one class set a purposeful goal—to address deforestation while helping girls attend school.

Many girls were forced to stay away from school to go out into the forest and collect firewood to use for cooking fuel. This practice had denuded the landscape of trees and left girls unprepared for the important economic and social role they play in society later, as women in society. The students and teachers set out to demonstrate for their community a way to make use of a much more abundant local resource. They made dung patties to use as cooking fuel.

Their wisdom exchange partner across the sea then shared solar cooker designs and materials, so that students in both countries could apply the sun, as well as the dung, and decide which resource emitted less methane and odor to help the girls come back to school.
